About the Great South Athletic Conference

The purpose of the Great South Athletic Conference is to provide an association through which the membership may encourage organized competition in intercollegiate sports. In particular, we recognize athletics as integral to the campus life program of our students and as essential to the total development of our student-athletes. We direct significant institutional resources to our athletic programs to assure that student-athletes have appropriate coaching, facilities, equipment and opportunities for travel to compete against other conference schools.

GSAC History

The Great South Athletic Conference was founded in 1999 as a group of National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Division III member institutions from the Southeast with similar academic and athletic interests. Charter members include Fisk University, LaGrange College, Maryville College, Piedmont College and Stillman College. In 2002, Huntingdon College and women's colleges Agnes Scott College and Wesleyan College were granted membership. In 2003, Spelman College was admitted to the GSAC on a provisional basis and given full membership status in 2005. The schools are located in Alabama, Georgia and Tennessee. All seven schools are active members of the NCAA Division III.

NCAA Division III

Colleges and universities in NCAA Division III place the highest priority on the overall quality of the educational experience and on the successful completion of all students' academic programs. They seek to establish and maintain an environment in which a student-athlete's athletic activities are conducted as an integral part of the student-athlete's educational experience. They also seek to establish and maintain an environment that values cultural diversity and gender equity among their student-athletes and athletic staff. The purpose of the NCAA is to assist its members in developing the basis for consistent and equitable competition while minimizing the infringement on the freedom of the individual institutions to determine their own special objectives and programs.

President's Cup

The President's Cup, one each for men and women, is awarded to the Great South Athletic Conference schools accumulating the highest points total in an academic year. This is based on order of finish in the championships. An institution not fielding a team in a conference championship will not be awarded points in that sport. Teams tied will divide equally the total number of points allotted for those two or more positions. Member institutions must declare and sponsor a sport as varsity status with the NCAA to participate and score in any conference championship. The scoring structure is based on a prorated points system with the conference champion receiving 100 points, second place garnering 90 points, etcetera.

2006-07 Year-In-Review

The Great South Athletic Conference has finished a successful 2006-07 athletic season with member institutions representing the conference on both the regional and national level. During the 2006-07 athletic season, the GSAC honored 115 All-Conference selections, 62 All-Freshman honorees and 217 All-Academic recipients.

Four different schools earned conference titles in the 2006-07 season. Maryville led the way with six championships. Maryville won championships in men's and women's cross country, women's soccer, volleyball, men's basketball and baseball. Piedmont had championships in men's soccer, men's tennis and women's basketball. Huntingdon won women's tennis and LaGrange won softball.

The GSAC President's Cup, honoring the conference's most outstanding men's and women's programs, was won by Maryville on both the men's and women's sides. Maryville and Piedmont are the only two member institutions to win President's Cups. Maryville has eight total President's Cup championships, while Piedmont has four Cups. Prior to the 2002-03 athletic season, the Cup was awarded on a men's and women's combined point total with Maryville and Piedmont each winning one award.

The 2006-07 year was the first year that the GSAC women's champions in soccer, volleyball, basketball, softball and tennis earned automatic bids to their respective NCAA national tournaments. Maryville received an NCAA Division III national tournament bid in men's basketball. Both LaGrange and Maryville earned bids in softball to the NCAA Division III national tournament. It was the first time the GSAC has sent two teams to a national tournament. Huntingdon represented the GSAC in tennis at the NCAA national tournament.

From I-75: Take I-75/85 to the Freedom Parkway exit. Continue on Freedom Parkway (at the fork, bear to the left) until it ends at Ponce de Leon Avenue. (1.9 miles). Turn right and follow W. Ponce de Leon towards Decatur. At the traffic light immediately following arched railroad trestle, bear to the right as W. Ponce de Leon forks to the right. (2.8 miles). Turn right onto W. Trinity Place. (0.5 miles). Turn right onto N. McDonough Street. (0.6 miles). Follow N. McDonough cross over the railroad to Agnes Scott College. (0.3 miles).

Huntingdon College • Montgomery, Ala.

From Atlanta: Take I-85 South to the Mulberry Street exit (exit 2). Turn left on Mulberry, right on Carter Hill Road, and then left on College Street, which runs straight into the Huntingdon College front entrance.

From Birmingham: Take I-65 to the I-65 and I-85 interchange in Montgomery. At the interchange, take I-85 North (toward Atlanta). Exit at Forest Avenue (exit 2). Continue straight across Forest Avenue on West 2nd Avenue to Mulberry, then turn right on Mulberry, right on Carter Hill Road, and left on College Street, which runs straight into the Huntingdon College front entrance.

From Mobile: Take I-65 North. Exit at Fairview Avenue (exit 170), then turn right and follow Fairview Avenue approximately two miles until just before it ends at the Montgomery Country Club. The front entrance to Huntingdon College will be on your right.

LaGrange College • LaGrange, Ga.

From Atlanta or Montgomery: Take Interstate 85 and use Exit 18. From Columbus: Take Interstate 185 North to Interstate 85 South and use Exit 18.

From Valdosta: Take Interstate 75 North to Tifton. From Tifton, take U.S. Highway 82 West. Highway 82 becomes State Route 520, then U.S. Highway 280. Follow U.S. Highway 280 to Columbus. From Columbus, take Interstate 185 North to Interstate 85 South and use Exit 18.

From Exit 18 off I-85: Drive into town on Lafayette Parkway (Hwy 109 W). Follow Lafayette Parkway through 10 stoplights. At the 11th light, turn right on Park Avenue. Take the first left into the College's main entrance.

Maryville College • Maryville, Tenn.

North From Chattanooga/Atlanta: Take I-75N toward Knoxville. Exit at Lenoir City, Highway 321 (just before getting to Knoxville) and turn right off the exit. Continue on 321 for approximately 20 miles (through Lenoir City) and you will come into Maryville. Continue straight and the college will be on the right (you will go under a "bridge" with Maryville College written on it; the campus is the second right turn).

East From Nashville: Take I-40E toward Knoxville. Exit at Oak Ridge, Highway 321 (before I-75) and turn right off the exit. Continue on 321 for approximately 25 miles (through Lenoir City) and you will come into Maryville. Continue straight and the college will be on the right (you will go under a "bridge" with Maryville College written on it; the campus is the second right turn).

Piedmont College • Demorest, Ga.

From Atlanta: I-85 North to I-985. I-985 becomes GA 365 in Gainesville, GA. Take GA 365 North to Demorest-Helen exit (U.S. Historic Route 441), Left to Demorest. Piedmont College two miles on right.

From Greenville, SC: I-85 South to GA 17. Left to Toccoa. Take bypass GA 17 - GA 365 to Demorest-Helen exit (U.S. Historic Route 441), Left to Demorest. Piedmont College two miles on right.

Spelman College • Atlanta, Ga.

From I-75/85: Take I-20 West and exit (#55B) at Lee Street. Turn right onto Lee Street and continue through the next traffic light (Westview Drive). You will see a large parking lot on the right-hand side. Turn right into the first driveway and you will approach the gates of Spelman College.

Wesleyan College • Macon, Ga.

From the North (Atlanta): Go south on I-75, through Forsyth. Past Forsyth, at the Visitor's Center, bear right onto I-475 South. The second exit is #9, Zebulon Road. (There are signs indicating that this is the Wesleyan College exit.) Exit and turn left onto Zebulon Road. You will go several miles on Zebulon Road, which turns residential once you have gone past the immediate area of the interstate. Zebulon Road ends at Forsyth Road. Turn right and, within a mile, the College will be on the right.

From the South (Valdosta/Perry): Go north on I-75. Before you get into Macon, bear left onto I-475, the Macon Bypass. Go to Exit #9, Zebulon Road. (There are signs indicating that this is the Wesleyan College exit.) Exit and turn right onto Zebulon Road. You will go several miles on Zebulon Road, which turns residential once you have gone past the immediate area of the interstate. Zebulon Road ends at Forsyth Road. Turn right and, within a mile, the College will be on the right.
